The Apache Way Introduction

The Apache Way is a set or behaviors and practices developed at the ASF and designed to promote **long-lived** successful projects by focusing on **stable governance** and encouraging **new contributors**.

These behaviors are required of all Apache projects.

 and users.

Community - No Jerks Allowed

- "No jerks allowed" a key early message
 - Apache communities value group contributors, not lone wolves
 - Diverse communities attract more new contributors over time
 - BDFL not allowed in Apache PMCs

Community - No Jerks Allowed

- "No jerks allowed" a key early message
 - Apache communities value group contributors, not lone wolves
 - Diverse communities attract more new contributors over time
 - BDFL not allowed in Apache PMCs

Be Excellent To Each Other

Community - Wear Your Hats

- You are an individual not an employee
- No corporate participation at Apache
- Individuals get recognition
 - Side effect for corporate teams: each employee participates separately
 - Side effect for you: your merit stays with you



Community - Check Affiliations At The Door

- Not talking about hierarchy
- Because we don't have one each project is separate
- We each volunteer with same powers
- Your PMC doesn't care what your dayjob role is



Community - Independent Governance

- ASF owns the trademarks
- ASF ensures neutrality, development
- PMC owns the brand
- PMCs govern independently

"It's not a hierarchy, it's a community"



Merit

Merit - What YOU Have ACTUALLY Done

Merit

The value **you** bring to the specific project, as defined in the **context of that project** by the project community.

"You gain merit by doing things that specific community values"



Merit - Growth

The more you do, the more power you may be granted to take actions:

- User
- Contributor
- Committer
- PMC Member
- PMC Chair / VP
- ASF Member
- Director



Merit - Not Authority

• Leaders or managers?

"Merit gets you privileges: commit access, voting on committers"

"Merit does not buy you authority - community must still agree"



Merit - Umbrella Projects

Problem area: Umbrella projects

Apache Jakarta was an umbrella project - with many different sub-projects and components and communities - each slightly different.

PMCs must be coherent communities to equitably recognize merit.

Open Development - Time Shifting

- Yes, we use mailing lists
- Asynchronous communication is critical
 - ...a dispersed community
 - ...dispersed in space
 - ...dispersed in abilities / expertise
 - ...dispersed in motivation
 - ...dispersed in time
- Only know each other through the project



Open Development - Archiving Everything

If It Didn't Happen On-List It Didn't Happen

- Asynchronous lists provide time for
 - feedback
 - critique
 - new ideas
 - others to show their work
- Must be public list unless there's a reason for private list

Allows newcomers to learn at any time



Open Development - Transparent Decisions

- Your motives aren't transparent to the community
 - Motivated by boss, by outside technical need, by just being a geek
 - How does this decision benefit the project

The right way to work is to:

- Telegraph your intent
- Draft designs openly
- Submit work in chunks
- Welcome feedback along the way



Open Development - Pragmatic License

- Apache License v2.0
- Maximum user freedom
- Trust in ASF as corporation
 - To maintain open development
 - To continue to provide source code

Apache Attic - where quiet projects slumber forever





Decision Making - Consensus Preferred

- Consensus within community
- Choose best path forward
 - Or even an improvement
 - Your perfection may be someone else's "meh"



Decision Making - Votes When Needed

"Voting is a way to record an official consensus"

"Voting is a shortcut to move consensus forward in a timely manner"



Decision Making - Timeline

- Minimum time to make a decision: 72 hours
- Allows time-shifted input from community



Decision Making - No Deadlines

- Because we don't have any besides those we agree on together
- Because our deadlines are earliest date something could happen



Communication

Communication - Kindness

Be kind.

Everyone here is a human being, and a volunteer.



Communication - Netiquette

Ask smart questions.



Communication - Conduct

Don't be a jerk; avoid the poisonous people... and help the community do something about it.

Communication - Language

"The core development activity must be in English."

- Translation software isn't social
- The whole community must be able to evaluate your work
- The board provides oversight to all communities
